## Chip Sealing: it's a good deal

Residents living at the northern end of Lake County will find several well-traveled roads having been and continuing to be chip sealed through mid August. The County road department suggests you use alternative routes and also if this is not possible, expect wait times of up to 30-40 minutes

Some drivers wonder why what they consider to be a good road is receiving this treatment. The answer is simple, treating roads early keeps them in good condition. More importantly it results in huge cost savings.

Chip sealing is a process where liquid asphalt is applied to seal the road. chipped rock coated with asphalt is applied to the seal and help improve driver traction. the chip seal protect the road from being eroded and preserves its ability to bend and

Statistically the cost of chip seal-\$25,000 per mile while the cost of a traditional three inch overlay of new asphalt, on the same mile of road, averages more than \$200,000

Chip seal, when applied at the right time in the life cycle of pavement can double the lifespan of the original asphalt and extend the time between pavement overlay treatments from 15 to 30 years.

The county will also be Fog sealing some of our roads. This process is more of a short term, preventative maintenance process and is often used to help preserve road surfaces needing work but waiting for funds to become available. A fog a single application of an asphalt emulsion onto an existing pavement. It renews oxidized pavement surfaces as well as sealing minor cracks and inhibiting raveling.



Then, a layer of plying is applied to protect the road. Not only does this prevent the road from becoming brittle and flexing, but it also helps in saving money by extending the life of the pavement.

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
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### COMINGS & GOINGS

I may as well start with the sad news that on Monday, June 27th I had to have my much loved German Shepherd companion, Kaspar, put to sleep. He was only four years old and up until about three months ago was a vibrant, high-energy pup. Then things changed. So for the last month of his life he ate cooked chicken, an occasional hot dog, and eggs.

He was happy, and was still striking his statue-like pose that indicated he was ready to play fetch with a ball. But his weight was falling off and his belly was beginning to fill. His energy was beginning to fade. I called Dr Halley and asked her if she would put him down at her clinic in Culver. I knew she would provide him a stress-free, peaceful end - one that would allow me to spend every last second with him.

I can't thank her enough for her generosity with her time and her abundant compassion. She is passionate about her chosen vocation. Kaspar was an amazing dog. He was stunning, with a classically beautiful head and dark shepherd mask. He loved his kitties, and all of the family dogs. It was not unusual to find him seeping by the front door with one of them curled up near his face. Although not

raised around small children, he quickly figured out how to manage them, and how to get them to play ball.

He is resting in the front yard in his favorite blanket and with his ball. By next summer there will be a nice patch of wild flowers on his grave. I am still not used to not being awakened by his cold nose at 6am or not opening the front door to see him grab a ball and take his pose. I miss him terribly and have decided that I simply don't want another Shepherd. Not because I don't love the breed, but because he was a once in a life-time dog of his breed. When the time comes I will bring home a puppy - preferably a rough coated Collie Dog. For now I am just settling into not having him by my side.



On the brighter side, I am excited to head out to Montana for a ten day Working Equitation Clinic and Horse Show. Daughter Jill and I have had this in the works since January. We will be traveling in her truck with her, new to her, goose-neck trailer with living quarters. Originally we were going to stay at an Air B&B, but she found this trailer on line and it was exactly what she has been looking for. Being gone for that long is actually a first for me since moving Christmas Valley 16 years ago. Time sure does have wings.

The weather has certainly been the subject of much discussion this "Spring???" Wind, and cold and more wind, and not a lot of sunshine and then of



course summer arrives overnight. My flowers seem to have either put themselves on hold or are just skipping this year's bloom altogether. The photo on page one is of one of the three Peonies that managed to escape the freeze and flower. Just one flower each but they are nevertheless beautiful and they smell so good. My Ornamental Poppies are finally maturing and producing multiple pods. So far three have opened with many more to come. All my little flowers are just beginning

The weekend begins with a performance of Romancing the West on Friday from 2-5 at the Community Center. This popular production features Christina and Butch Martin who relive the history of the American West through music, videos, stories and poetry. This epic journey takes the audience through the human story, the trials tribulations and triumphs, celebrating diverse cultures and legacies. There will be a dance outdoors in the basketball court on Friday evening from 8-10.

During the weekend, vendors will display their wares outdoors. Several Paisley students submitted designs for this year's Festival tee shirts. Anna Robinson's design was selected. The tee shirts come in two styles, vee-neck or unisex collar.


Mosquito Festival has a long history in Paisley. Because swarms of mosquitoes breed in the Chewaucan meadows, residents needed screened-in porches if they wanted


Most of these cars are in museums or private collections so it's likely you will never see another.

One thing to mind during the heat of June is to make sure that your colonies have a source of water. As mentioned in previous articles, even though they are gathering lots of liquid gold they still need the basis of life, water. During HOT days the girls will bring in water to the hive and some will fan their wings to create a mini swamp cooler, just like what we use to keep our homes cool; same process just in a much smaller scale.

I inspected my hives again and all are well except one of the packages. It is pooping along and still and has not expanded like the rest of the colonies. It has filled only one deep brood box. Lazy queen I suspect. I will give it another couple of weeks and inspect again. If she is still being lazy I will order a new queen and replace her.

June 21 was the Summer equinox and now the Queen Mother senses that she needs to start scaling back on her brood production. How does she know that ??? Eons of evolution I would surmise.

The girls, this month, are gathering as much nectar as possible in preparation for the upcoming dearth and winter. Do a weekly check if you have the time, but if not, make sure to be aware of any

Some new beekeepers may think if sugar water is good, then real honey

activity around the entrance. Take the time to investigate; the colony might have swarmed out and thereby taken more than half of the girls with the old queen. Not to worry too much but just make sure in a week or two you check to see if you still see new eggs and brood.

A mistake Beekeepers tend to make is opening the hives too often.

will be even better. This may be a serious mistake. Honey from other hives from outside your homeland that is fed to your girls may bring in unwanted diseases. Some of the worst diseases can be spread by tainted honey. Better to feed sugar water that to risk introducing such diseases



as foul brood.

Another big OOPS from your (my) standpoint is skimping on protective gear and/or not making sure you are zipped up! Personal experience; I got in a hurry to work bees and did not zip up my suit. In short order my stomach and chest were on fire with multiple stings! You see experienced beekeepers work their bees with just a veil - more power to them. I have tried it a few times but...stings HURT! Bee sensible, suit up.

Not using your smoker is a biggie. I first thought, "Why torture the girls with smoke?" Bee cuz it *Calms* them and distracts them! Isn't it better to work your girls with some smoke rather than being bombarded by angry bees? The smoke distracts them and blocks chemical signals the girls send to one another which could help them better organize a defense against you.

Another mistake some new beekeepers make is to hurry through an inspection. The girls will pick up on that and may get agitated. As Woody said in an episode of Cheers, "No Sudden Movements!"

I have learned that the INTERNET has a wealth of knowledge just waiting for you to gather. Expand your horizons!

Just when you think you know what is going on, you might just be surprised by the Queen Mother and her girls.

Sid from Sid's Fresh Produce gifted me with a container of beautiful strawberries. They were yummy and I wanted to do something different with them than the usual shortcake. With company coming, I needed a simple dessert and this fills the bill. Top with whipped cream and serve.

## Strawberry Upside down Cake



- 2 Tbsp Butter
- 1/4 Cup Brown sugar
- 1 1/2 Cup Strawberries, sliced at least 1/4 " thick
- 1 1/3 cups unbleached Flour
- 1 tsp Baking Powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp Baking Soda
- 1/4 tsp Cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp Nutmeg
- 1 Stick Butter, room temperature
- 3/4 Cup sugar
- 1 Large Egg
- 1 tsp Vanilla Extract
- 2/3 Cup sour Cream

Preheat oven to 350°. Butter a 9 inch cake pan. Line with parchment paper, buttered.

Melt butter in the cake pan in oven. Stir in Brown Sugar and spread evenly over bottom of pan. Then arrange sliced Strawberries evenly over the Butter/Brown Sugar mixture

Whisk together Flour, Baking Powder & Salt in a medium bowl. Set aside.

With an electric mixer, cream Butter and Sugar together. Scrape bowl and add Vanilla and Egg. Beat on high for about 3 minutes, stopping to scrape bowl occasionally.

With mixer on low speed, blend Flour into wet mixture, alternating with Sour Cream until smoothly combined.

Scrape batter into pan and carefully spread over the Strawberry layer. Bake for 35 - 40 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center of the cake comes out clean.

Cool cake in pan for 10 minutes or so. Run a knife around the edge of pan. Lay cake platter on top of pan and invert the pan and plate. Let settle for a few minutes and slowly lift the cake pan off the now upside down cake.

Serve warm topped with freshly whipped, slightly sweetened Cream and more sliced Strawberries. A colorful addition add a few blueberries to the Strawberries.

## CHINESE CABAGE SALAD

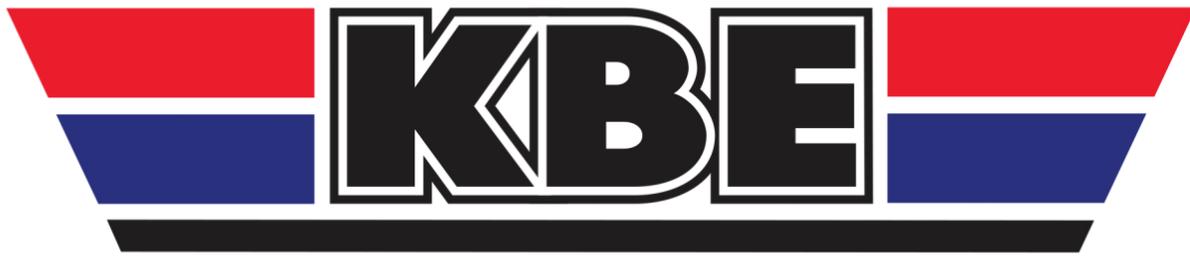
- 1 Medium Napa Cabbage

- 1 teaspoon salt

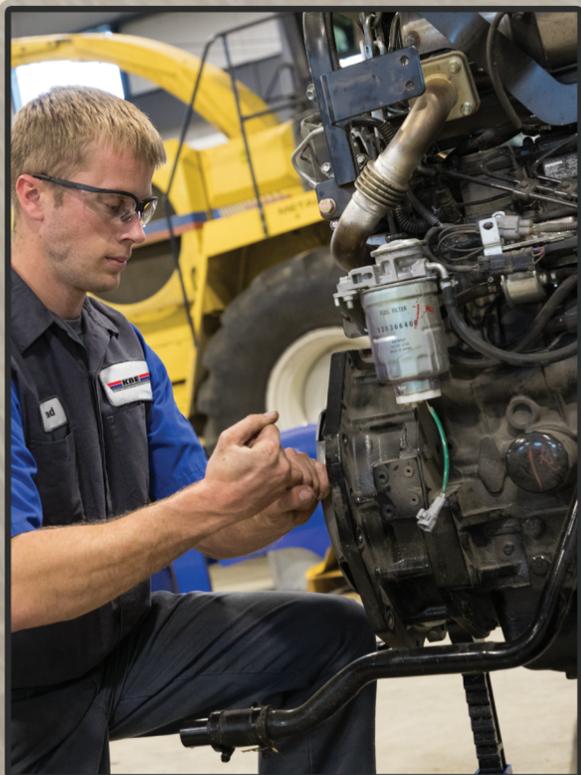
